I, as you know, am the Kiva Goat, the mascot of the Kiva Microloan Project at Follen Church. The Giving Tree is coming in December and Kiva again is participating. This is our only fundraiser. Most of you know the drill by now. Kiva's mission is to connect people, through lending, for the sake of alleviating poverty. Kiva empowers individuals to lend to an entrepreneur across the globe. Individual loans of \$25 are made to a specific low-income entrepreneur across the globe. When the loans are paid back, the funds are loaned out again to new entrepreneur. In other words, we have created a bank at Follen Church for such entrepreneurs. It's a powerful and sustainable way to empower someone right now to lift themselves out of poverty.

But wait, there is something new this year (this is where the whispering comes in). You have more choices now. Tell us your preferences on who you want to loan to (male, female, groups or individuals), where to loan (there are over 70 countries including the United States) what sector you want (including agriculture, education, the arts, construction, to name a few) and the attribute you would like (including green, fair trade, conflict zones). Kiva Committee members will then lovingly take your requests and match a loan as only they can. You will then receive a description (along with our great appreciation) of your loan. (People can also donate any amount to the general fund as well.) So think whispering sweet nothings into the ear of a goat is a little strange? Well maybe. But try it, you might like it. Traveling the Road to Roxbury

What on earth are all those suburban UUs doing in Roxbury? Lots of things: tutoring, cooking, working on a nonprofit’s website, looking after young children while their mothers go to a class... and that’s just for starters. *Right now*, the [UU Urban Ministry](#) needs an ESL tutor for Monday and Wednesday mornings who speaks Spanish or Haitian Creole, tutors for the after-school program for grades 8–12, a team to organize a Valentine’s Day event for Renewal House families, and—on another note—a large refrigerator for Renewal House. But why won’t Follen be there for our Thanksgiving service? The two primary reasons are that the timeline for planning the service would have precluded Rev. Claire’s participation, and after six years of this labor-intensive undertaking, it seemed time to take a breather and recharge. (See more in [February’s Newsletter](#), p. 7.) Partner Church News



Partner Church Committee meets Sunday, Nov 3 at noon in the Emerson/Alcott Room with Cathy Cordes, Executive Director, of the UU Partner Church Council. Please join us as Cathy shares what the current mission and best practices of the Partner Church Council are and how to sustain a healthy and ethical financial connection with our Partner Church.

A summer traveler to our Partner Church in Alsófelsoszentmihály, Sharran Hariry, wrote these reflections about her recent visit.

When I prepared to travel to Transylvania last summer, I expected to learn about the sources of Unitarianism by visiting churches and hearing the stories of leaders from the 1500's. Both of these I experienced. But another experience was, for me, even more profound.

When we arrived in our partner village, we were warmly greeted by our host families. I was to stay in the home of Jozsef and Marika Csep. Their son, Akos, would stay with us during the day and serve as a translator, and then return to his wife in a neighboring village at night. Akos was a friendly young man with a broad smile. As he drove me to his parents' home, he explained that he was available because, although a college-graduate, he was facing a very difficult employment situation, so severe that many young Transylvanians are forced to emigrate. Akos's sister Katalin had already moved with her husband to London to work as a surgical nurse.

The Csep home was surrounded by a solid six-foot stucco fence. Inside the fence, every inch of the yard seemed to be filled with cultivated plants, with all types of herbs, grapes, and berries, plus four large green houses growing beautiful vegetables. Jozsef and Marika greeted me graciously, and because Akos translated so efficiently, communication flowed easily.

Jozsef had recently suffered an industrial accident that nearly severed his leg. It had cost him his job and almost his life. So it fell to Marika, who herself had overcome a bout with cancer, to work with the fruits and vegetables long hours, sometimes in temperatures over 100 degrees, to provide for the family. She then took the produce to market to sell. She also created wine and jams and other elegant foods from her produce. When I asked if she joined the ladies groups at the church, she replied, "I wish I could, but I must care for my plants."

Through all the family's difficulties, Akos had been there to give his support. As he helped me with my iPad, I told his parents they were very fortunate to have a son with such wonderful computer skills. I told them that my son, like me, is not into technology. "Take my son!" Marika responded immediately, no doubt thinking of better employment opportunities in America.

The Csep family's life reminded me that the source of Unitarianism goes back much further than the 1500's. Spiritual people have long recognized that, in spite of the tremendous hardships that must be endured, there is a force that flows through the seasons and the generations. It is universal, and it allows many forms of life, when gifted with tender loving care, to flourish.

Finally, our Committee is pleased to announce that the Rev. Jozsef Dimeny will be celebrating his tenth year with our Partner Church. Our committee has videotaped our personal congratulations which will be shared during the service honoring him and his years of ministry.
